ABOUT US



The Economics Department of Ramanujan College takes pride in being among the best departments for the study of Economics at the undergraduate level. It comprises young and dynamic faculty with diverse specializations and interests. It was in July 2013 that the B. A. (Hons.) course was introduced in Ramanujan College under the guidance of Professors of the Delhi School of Economics. The teaching methodology at Ramanujan combines standard methods of University education, i. e., lectures, and tutorials – with written assignments, project work, field trips, and student presentations both in class and in seminars. The faculty endeavors to preserve the vibrant academic atmosphere to provide high-quality education from both theoretical and practical perspectives. All activities of the Department are aimed at encouraging students in various extra-curricular and cocurricular activities, which encourage them to explore beyond the frontiers of the prescribed syllabus, evaluate economic issues and interact with experts from diverse areas of specialization.

COURSE OUTLINE B.A. (HONS) ECONOMICS

The B.A. (Hons) Economics course is structured under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) followed by the University of Delhi. Students' academic performance is marked on final examination carrying 75 marks and internal assessment of 25 marks per paper.

All students are required to read the following papers as part of the course.

14 CORE COURSE PAPERS

These are compulsory papers that students read during three years (2x3 semesters) and tailored to develop thorough knowledge to develop the foundation in economics.

4 GENERIC ELECTIVES (GE) PAPERS

These papers provide an opportunity to the students to opt for papers in disciplines other than economics to broaden their overall training in the program.



02 4 DISCIPLINE SPECIFIC ELECTIVES (DSE) PAPERS

These are elective papers that intend to equip the students with advanced undergraduate training in specialized areas of economics and are offered in the fifth and sixth semesters of the program.

2 ABILITY ENHANCEMENT COMPULSORY COURSE (AECC) PAPERS

The outcome of these two papers is to provide basic knowledge in the field of Communication and Environmental Sciences.

05 2 SKILL ENHANCEMENT COURSE PAPERS

TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

PEDAGOGY

Apart from Regular Teaching Methods which include Standard Classroom Teaching, Use of Presentation, other visuals, and Non-Traditional methods are also practiced.

- **Group Discussion:** Students are encouraged to engage in classroom-based group discussion activities on given themes, which is followed by Question & Answer rounds.
- Participant-centric Learning: Students are divided into small groups of 4-5 and are then given various activities, which help them relate theory with the real-world scenario. The idea is to develop a dynamic environment in which students try to elaborate on what they have been studying in a particular area.
- **Field Surveys:** Students are given field projects in a group size of 4–5 to promote a better understanding of various sampling methods and work as a team to build team spirit.

Case-Based Studies: This technique is based on resolving real-life cases through group analysis, brainstorming, innovation, and creative ideas.

Self-learning: The key is to let students focus on exploring an area, which interests them and learn about it for themselves through one-to-one interaction and reassessment of concepts during contact hours.

Research Projects and Group Presentations: Research Projects conducted by students in groups to analyze Macroeconomic Theories, Mathematical Methods and their applications.

■ Non-Conventional Tools

- The One-Sentence Summary (Assessing Skill in Synthesis and Creative Thinking): The instructor asks students during every Group Discussion exercise to answer the questions about a given topic: "Who does what to whom, when, where, how, and why"? Then the student is asked to transform responses to those questions into a single, grammatical sentence.
- **Group Discussion-based Evaluation:** Students are required to go through the desired readings prior to Group-Discussion (GD) sessions. They are then required to discuss the given topic for about 60 minutes. This is then followed by a Q&A session, which goes on for about 45 minutes. The evaluation is then done based on the analytical and presentation skills of students, which has 60% weightage in total evaluation. This is followed by the submission of a report for the given GD topic that carries a 40% weightage of evaluation.
- **Field-Survey-based Evaluation:** Students are required to carry out surveys in groups of 8-10 on given economic issues for various applications of statistical and econometric concepts, which has 50% weightage in evaluation. This is followed by the submission of a detailed report of the economic and statistical analysis done, which carries the remainder 50% weightage in total evaluation.
- Term Paper Writing (Assessing Skill in Application and Performance): This is used to denote a research project, which prompts students to think through elements of the assignment such as the topics, purpose, intended audience, major questions to be answered, basic organization, and time and resources required. It helps in focusing on tasks to be accomplished, skills to be improved, and products to be developed.
- **Regular online Assessment:** For Mathematical Methods of Economics(MME), a regular online test of each unit is taken through My Lab (Pearson) to check the understanding of students of a particular unit that has been studied.

Students are expected to be able to apply economic analysis to everyday problems in real-world situations, to understand current events and evaluate specific policy proposals, and to evaluate the role played by assumptions in arguments that reach different conclusions to a specific economic or policy problem

Students are expected to understand how to use empirical evidence to evaluate the validity of an economic argument, use statistical methodology, interpret statistical results and conduct appropriate statistical analysis of data.

- 3. The complaint boxes are placed on the College campus, accessible for all.
- 4. CCTV cameras installed in the College at various points, the constant vigil of male and female security guards and members of teaching/non-teaching staff with due instructions from the Principal, taking rounds in the various locations of the College, has turned the College into a complete no ragging zone.
- 5. Punishment of ragging is suspension or expulsion or cancellation of the degree or Penal Action.

Personal Issues



- THE STUDENTS ARE ALSO REQUIRED TO REGARD THE EVENTS BEING ORGANIZED BY THE COLLEGE DEPARTMENTS AND ONCE THE SAID EVENT COMMENCES, STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED TO NOT CAUSE ANY DISTURBANCE THROUGHOUT THE ENTIRETY OF THE EVENT.
- FOLLOWING THE SAME, THE STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED NOT TO CARRY FOOD ITEMS INSIDE THE AUDITORIUM AND MAINTAIN THE DECORUM OF THE PLACE.
